

Academic Progress Monitoring Systems Update

Math - MDTP administered in the fall and spring. No data presented today. Detailed analysis in May report.


Science - Tracking student growth on the Next Generation Science Standards. Students were tested on ALL of the Next Generation Science Standards for their course mid-year, and will be tested again at the Next year, students will be tested in the first month of school, in the middle of the year, and at the end of the year.

Social Science - Assessment still in development. Standard based tools not available so the SS department is creating subject specific assessments that are content relevant.

World Language - Developed an assessment to track language acquisition growth from Spanish 1-3 last year. Students respond to a writing prompt and are identified as "emergent", "proficient", or "advanced" Administered three times a year.


ELA - SRI administered in the fall, winter and spring. Mid-year data will be shared tonight. ELA department is looking into other tools to expand scope of progress monitoring.

Class of 2022 Graduation Progress





Comparison of 2021 and 2022 Proficiency


Key Observations

- There are somewhat fewer students in the Advanced range in 2022
- Percentage of students meeting proficiency (either Proficient range or Advanced) is within 5% when comparing 2022 to 2021 for grades 6, 8, 9, and 12
- 2022 Grades 7, 10, and 11 proficiencies are within +/-10% compared to 2021
- 2022 6th grade is now slightly higher in proficiency than in 2021, but not statistically significant
- Figures for Below Basic and Basic have tended to stay somewhat fixed


Comparison over Four Years






January 2021






Middle School Proficiency January 2021 and January 2022

Senior Note: As with 2021, we are facing some challenges with getting seniors to complete the SRI and to put forth their best effort. 87% of seniors have at some point tested at proficient or advanced, while 6% tested Below Basic and 7% tested Basic. Interventions are already in place for most students who have never reached proficiency. We do not have growth figures for 48 seniors, but 39 of those 48 have tested at Proficient or above.

The Cohort chart shows the average growth for each class for each year. There are four data points for grades 9-12, but only three for 8, 2 for 7, and 1 for 6.

The Grade Level chart shows the average growth of each grade level over four years. The blank spots are expected because data for students who have graduated is not available.

Both charts show that average growth decreases as students move into the upper grades. This is in line with typical SRI growth patterns.




Coordination of Student Services

- Referral system & progress monitoring is effective to identify need for Tier 2 support.
 - Referrals made by teachers/staff
 - 36 students self requested counseling or drop in services
 - 51 students in or concluded short term counseling with our Mental Health Team
 - 17 students have returned from hospitalization with individualized support plan

- Summer 2021 Recovery (tentative)














Covid Update

- School closure
 - Due to staff shortage (19 people out in one day)
 - Only 3 people out when we returned
 - J13A process in motion
- Updated Protocols

The Numbers - Week 1-22








Covid Survey Feedback
